

## Editorial

I am pleased to present to the Readers of *Acta Archaeologica Carpathica* the consecutive, LV volume of this magazine. Likewise the previous, also this one constitutes a documentation of a scientific event, contributing considerably to the archaeology of the Polish Carpathians, as together with its fairly sprawling surroundings.

This is regarding the text of the papers, having been presented during the international congress upon “*Movement and stabilization. Przeworsk Culture within the upper parts of the Tisa River basin over the Roman Period*”.

The conference was held from May 23<sup>rd</sup> to 25<sup>th</sup> 2018 in the Tapestry Room of the Sanok Royal Castle, as in joint-cooperation with the Historical Museum in Sanok, and the Institute of Archaeology of the Jagiellonian University. The editors would like to express their appreciation for the authors over their contribution to the both volumes, as well as acknowledge with thanks for the exquisite standard of the texts provided. On this occasion it should be noted that the participants of the congress decided to dedicate their articles to Professor Renata Madyda-Legutko, a tireless explorer of the Polish Carpathians, who in November 2018 celebrated the beautiful jubilee of her 70th birthday.

As it was the case for the previous volume, also this time would the editorial office like to express their gratitude to the professor for her professional



achievements, particularly substantiating the archaeology of the Roman period, and as part of it, for a valuable animation of the development of archaeological research into the Carpathian region, to finally conclude by wishing Professor Renata Madyda-Legutko further success and an overall scientific satisfaction.
