**Piotr Boćko** – a pedagogue, Doctor of Humanities, lecturer at the Koszalin University of Technology, Polish Border Guard officer (Main Border Guard Training Centre in Koszalin), member of the scientific council of the Bulletin of the prof. Stanisław Batawia Polish Society of Criminology of the Institute for Legal Studies, Polish Academy of Sciences. Scientific interests: criminology, social pathologies, border crime, combating and preventing human trafficking.

**Agnieszka Chwieduk** – a French and Romanian philologist and a social anthropologist working in the Institute of Anthropology and Ethnology, Adam Mickiewicz University in Poznań. Her scientific and research interests are in three areas: 1) medical/psychiatric anthropology; 2) migration studies and locality; and 3) processuality in didactics and qualitative studies: performativity, participation, Emic Evaluation Approach, dialogism in situations of a difficult access to groups (totalizing spaces, small communities). The researcher's latest exploration experience concerns migration/detention in Guarded Centres for Foreigners in Poland (2018–2019) as a part of the project Spaces of Detention: Formal-organisational and Sociocultural Aspects, but was previously related to the issues of ethnicity, identity and locality in the uniting Europe – inter alia from the areas of Romania, France (Alsace) and Poland. She is the author and a co-author of three monographs, 43 articles and review papers, and a co-editor of the journal LUD – a leading Polish periodical in the area of ethnology and anthropology.

**Dariusz Niedźwiedzki** – sociologist and social anthropologist; Associate Professor at the Institute of European Studies of the Jagiellonian University in Krakow; director of this Institute (2012–2020); head of the Jagiellonian Center for Migration Studies (2014–2022); member of the Committee on Migration Research of the Polish Academy of Sciences (since 2012), currently a member of the Presidium of this Committee (since 2019). Vice-President of the Polish Society for European Studies (since 2019). His scientific interests include research and analysis on the problems of constructing and reconstructing social identity, migration, social memory, ethnic conflicts, social and cultural changes in integrating Europe, and the relationship between culture and politics. He is the author, co-author, editor and co-editor of thirteen books and over 70 articles. He authored, among others, *In the Banality of Forgetting. Tracing the Memory of Jewish Culture in Poland* (with Sławomir Kaprański and Jacek Nowak, Peter Lang 2018), *Detencja cudzoziemców w Polsce. Perspektywa teoretyczno-metodologiczna* (with Jacek Schmidt, ZW Nomos 2020).

His main research interests are migration studies (especially detention of immigrants), border studies, social science methodology. Selected recent publications: (with D. **Maciej Stępka** – a political scientist and an assistant professor at the Institute of European Studies, Jagiellonian University. He earned his degrees from the Jagiellonian University (MA), University of Amsterdam (MSc), and University of Warsaw (PhD). He specializes in new and critical security studies, focusing mainly on the migration-security nexus, EU crisis management, securitization studies, and research on risk and resilience. His most recent publications include an open access monograph entitled *Identifying Security Logics in the EU Policy Discourse: The 'Migration Crisis' and the EU* (Springer Nature).

**Przemysław Tacik** – Assistant Professor at the Institute of European Studies of the Jagiellonian University in Krakow and Director of the Nomos: Centre for International Research on Law, Culture and Power. A philosopher, lawyer and sociologist by education, he holds PhDs in philosophy (2014) and international law (2016). In the philosophical branch of his academic activity he focuses on Jewish philosophy and contemporary philosophy, with a particular interest on the philosophical construction of modernity. He has authored four books as well as over 40 articles and one translation of a poetry volume (from French to Polish). He authored, among others, *Freedom of Lights. Edmond Jabès and Jewish Philosophy of Modernity* (Peter Lang 2019) and *A New Philosophy of Modernity and Sovereignty: Towards Radical Historicisation* (Bloomsbury 2021).
