Eugenia Bojoga is a professor of General Linguistics and Romance Linguistics at Babeş-Bolyai University in Cluj-Napoca (Romania). She holds a doctorate in linguistics (*Receptarea teorei lui E. Coseriu în fosta URSS/Reception of E. Coseriu's theory in the former USSR*). Bojoga's research activity focuses on sociolinguistics, language policy, linguistic historiography, Romance languages. She wrote several studies in these fields, dealing in particular with the Romanian language from the Republic of Moldova and with the linguistic theory of Eugenio Coseriu. Timothée Charmion is an assistant in the department of Romance philology at the University of the National Education Commission, Kraków where he teaches French language. Having worked in university but also in primary, middle and high schools in France and Poland, he is currently preparing a PhD about the repertoires of contemporary dramaturgy for children and youth. Mainly focused on the field of French and Francophone authors, his research and work involve, among other things, adaptations of Perrault's fairy tales in the contemporary dramaturgy for children and youth.

Marie Giraud-Claude-Lafontaine – titulaire d'un doctorat consacré aux nouvelles formes d'engagement littéraire dans la littéraire francophone contemporaine de Belgique, Marie Giraud-Claude-Lafontaine est lectrice de langue française à la Faculté de Lettres de l'Université de Porto et chercheuse à l'Institut de littérature comparée Margarida Losa. Elle s'intéresse à la littérature francophone de Belgique, aux littératures contemporaines ainsi qu'à l'analyse textuelle et à l'approche sociocritique des textes littéraires. Lukasz Kraj, a graduate in French and Portuguese studies, as well as the anthropology of literature from the Jagiellonian University in Krakow, is currently pursuing his PhD on Earth imagery in European modernist poetry. Employed at the Faculty of Polish Studies of JU, he leads a grant project, "Rooted and Uprooted in Polish Poetry of 20th and 21st Centuries: A Project of Phytographic Criticism," funded by the Polish Ministry of Education and Science. Awarded for the best Master's thesis in literary studies in Poland, he authored a monograph on the pietà in 20th-century literature and visual arts.
