Ana Belén Cao Míguez is an assistant lecturer at the Department of Letters of the University of Beira Interior (Covilhã, Portugal), where she is currently coordinating the master's degree in Portuguese and Spanish Languages Teaching. She holds a PhD in Comparative Literature Studies at the Nova University of Lisbon, Portugal, a BA degree in Hispanic Philology from the University of Salamanca, Spain, and a BA degree in Portuguese Philology from the University of Santiago de Compostela, Spain. Her main areas of interest as a scholar are Comparative Literature, History of Translation, and Iberian Studies.
