Wojciech Cendrowski is a PhD candidate at the Faculty “Artes Liberales”, University of Warsaw. He has undertaken ethnographic fieldworks in Poland and Russia. His research interests focus on urban studies; interaction between landscape and identity in constructing local communities; ontological turn in anthropology.
