1. Uwagi ogólne

Ćwiczenie *Write a poem* jest adresowane do studentów wszystkich kierunków humanistycznych.

- 2. Poziom zaawansowania: B1/B2
- 3. Czas trwania opisanych ćwiczeń: 15–25 minut (w zależności od inwencji twórczej studentów)

4. Cele dydaktyczne

Ćwiczenie to ma charakter rozgrzewki (*a warmer*) na początku zajęć. Może być wstępem do bardziej poważnej analizy tekstów literackich.

5. Uwagi i sugestie

Jest to bardzo frapujące ćwiczenie, wykonywane chętnie przez studentów. Należy tylko przed rozpoczęciem zrobić żartobliwy wstęp, w którym przekonujemy studentów, że na poczekaniu mogą stworzyć swój wierszyk, i to w języku angielskim. W moich grupach niektórym udało się nawet napisać wiersz rymowany. Jeżeli chcemy na tych samych zajęciach omówić jakiś wiersz, jest to doskonały wstęp do takich zajęć.
